The Department of Economics_offers one of the largest majors at the University of Pittsburgh and has a vibrant research community with more than 60 graduate students working towards their Ph.D. in economics. Faculty and Ph.D. students explore fields in all areas of economics: applied microeconomics, economic theory, macroeconomics, econometrics, international economics and experimental economics. Our department is excited to welcome a new group of MQE students into our robust community.

The University of Pittsburgh is ranked among the top research universities in the United States in both domestic and international rankings and it has been listed as a "best value" in higher education by several publications. Pitt faculty and alumni have won the Nobel Prize (in Peace and Medicine), the Pulitzer, the Academy Award, the MacArthur "Genius" Grant, the National Medal of Science, the Super Bowl, and more.

Pittsburgh is an exciting place for economics. Faculty and Ph.D. students collaborate with researchers from other Pitt units as well as from Carnegie Mellon University and RAND. Pittsburgh, also known as the "City of Champions" for its athletic teams, Steel City for its more than 300 steel-related businesses and the City of Bridges for its 446 bridges. New regional investments, including in autonomous vehicles, additive manufacturing, robotics and the ethane cracker, have the potential to add substantial new job demand, particularly for STEM workers.

MQE Overview

The Master of Science in Quantitative Economics (MQE) program will equip students with the quantitative, analytical and communication skills needed to identify and resolve complex economic issues using a broad spectrum of quantitative techniques that are useful across contexts in the private, public and non-profit sector. MQE graduates will meet employers' demand for professionals who master analytic methods and techniques of data-driven economics. The degree will be completed in two semesters. The MQE Director and Program Manager are the principal advisors for all new MQE students.

The MQE program has three goals:

- 1. to advance ones professional economic and data science knowledge through an intensive and balanced academic program.
- 2. to help formulate questions and solutions critical for organizations.
- 3. to develop the essential communication skills for career success.

This document describes the rules, requirements, and responsibilities of MQE students during their residency in the Department of Economics at the University of Pittsburgh. It is assumed that all students in the MQE program are familiar with the material in this document and agree to abide by the rules, requirements, and responsibilities as set forth below. Students also agree to abide by all University of Pittsburgh academic regulations for graduate students as set forth in the University's Graduate and Professional Catalog, https://catalog.upp.pitt.edu/index.php.

Credit Requirements & Course Descriptions

The requirement for the MS in Quantitative Economics degree is to earn 30 credits in the academic courses listed below with cumulative GPA of 3.00 or above. Students are enrolled in ten, 3-credit courses over two consecutive Fall and Spring semesters. Courses are graded corresponding the letter grades (LG option) on the standard scale A, B, C, etc. Graded courses in which the student earns a grade of C or lower do not count toward the 30-credit requirement.

The MQE graded coursework requirement is to be completed according to the following schedule within two semesters:

Career Advising

The MQE Program offers each enrolled student individualized career services through professional:

- networking events with industry leaders.
- mentoring inside and outside of the classroom.
- development of communication and project management skills.

- workshops on writing effective cover letters and resume.
- support in the job search, application and interview process.

The MQE Program is a STEM-designated degree program (CIP Code 45.0603: Econometrics and Quantitative Economics) whose students can apply for a 24-month STEM extension of F-1 Optional Practical Training (OPT) (https://www.ois.pitt.edu/sites/default/files/docs/OPT-Information.pdf).

Along with the MQE Career Services, Pitt's Career Center (https://www.studentaffairs.pitt.edu/cdpa/) can help you to develop the skills and experiences needed to achieve your career goals.

Satisfactory Progress, Probation and Dismissal

Satisfactory Progress toward the MQE degree is maintained with an overall 3.0 GPA minimum requirement and adherence to the University's Academic Integrity Code (www.as.pitt.edu/faculty/policy/integrity.html) which governs cheating, plagiarism, etc.

Students may be dismissed from the program for any of the following reasons:

- Violations of the University's Academic Integrity Code (<u>www.as.pitt.edu/faculty/policy/integrity.html</u>) which governs cheating, plagiarism, etc.
- Failure to achieve the minimum required GPA or to maintain satisfactory progress.

Any student who is not making satisfactory progress toward completion of the degree, as defined above, may be placed on probation by the department. The student will be informed in writing of such action. The MQE Steering Committee will serve to arbitrate disputes, and the Dietrich School Ombudsperson (https://www.asgraduate.pitt.edu/student-life/ombudsperson) can assist graduate students with resolving conflicts and issues that arise during their graduate education that have not or cannot be addressed within their academic department.
